Worship and Music: Sandy Mehalko thanked everyone who sings in the choir or serves as lectors, greeters, or cantors. She also encouraged more people to become involved.

Ann Marie Hadesty had addressed this and advised it is included in the budget and is accounted for, but it is not a separate line item. It also had been addressed it has always been like this for the fiscal meeting. The more detailed report is presented to the congregation at the February meeting. A change for this may be presented at a later date.
- After thorough review and no further discussion a motion was made by Rochelle Evanousky, seconded by Sam Caley to accept the budget. Motion Passed.

ELECTION OF NEW COUNCIL MEMBERS

• The two potential candidates, Nathan Gerace and Andrew Deitrich, for church council were introduced to the congregation. By the motion of Art Connely, seconded by George Taylor, the two candidates were elected by acclamation as there were 2 seats to fill and 2 candidates. Motion Passed.

On May 7, 2017 I was called and ordained to serve Zion Lutheran church in Tamaqua. Over 300 people attended my ordination at Nativity Lutheran Church in Allentown Pa. I was overwhelmed by the generosity of all of the people that attended and sent cards and good wishes. Both Zion and Nativity choirs joined together and sang for this glorious service. I will never forget that day. It was one of the best of my life. My 89 year old mother got to put my first stole on and managed NOT to cry!! I think everyone else did!! Nativity members are STILL talking about all of the delicious deserts the members of Zion took down for the reception.

The biblical quote above is the one my advisor Dr. Maria Erling chose for me when I graduated from Lutheran seminary in Gettysburg on May 12th 2017. Yes, It was after I was ordained!! It was not the usual order for seminarians, however, my seminary journey was unique!! The Bishop allowed me to serve Zion with a supervisor for internship and go to seminary part time. This is all because this is what the candidacy committee requested of the Bishop. One of the things I love about the members of Zion is that we think out of the box. This is why you have a Saturday night service, Trunk or Treat, Soft Pretzel sales, A Christmas at Whoville etc. etc. PLEASE know how much I appreciate our creative spirit!!

We celebrated the 500th anniversary of the Reformation in style this past year with several events. The most amazing was the organ recital and concert that Sandy Mehalko organized. The culinary prepared a gournet reception after the concert. We also had a great time with our flat Luthers'which we displayed all year. Deb Davies had the confirmands write their service on the Reformation, artfully drew and painted a Katie and Martin Luther and Bob Jones included information about the reformation every week in our bulletins'. I had planned for this past year to be a celebration of the Reformation. I had no idea it would be so wonderful!!! Thanks to everyone that made it such a memorable year.

Shirley Tirpak was installed as our new Sunday School Superintendent. We purchased new curriculum for our Sunday school. The Family service on Christmas eve was a result of Shirley and Sandy Mehalko putting their heads together and creating and amazing program with our Sunday School Students. Our program for Sunday School is titled "Ignite your Faith". Step into our preschool class any Sunday and watch the magic happen. Jesus is alive and well with the children of Zion.

I determined NOT to organize a stewardship committee because we have a capitol Campaign committee which will be operation over the next ten years. I believe it would not be advantageous at this time to have a designated "Stewardship Committee". I will however be talking about Stewardship and so will the Finance committee over the next year. The Finance committee is currently working on a Long Term giving trifold for members. More to come later.

Deb Davies ran a very successful VBS with the help of many members. She plans to do the same for 2018. Due to Deb's involvement on special projects, I took over the confirmation classes. Only God know what she will come up with next!!

Our Outreach Committee serves as our evangelism committee. I will not be initiating any additional committees until I see more involvement from parishioners'. Zion has typically had a small group of disciples doing all of the work. This is beginning to change. We need to see more people getting involved with our church activities.

I officiated for many funerals this past year......6 of which were not members of our church. This is also an outreach and evangelism component of our ministry here at Zion. I want you to know, this is why I offer my services to the funeral directors. It gives our community of faith a very good name in the community.

We received 16 new members this year which is something to celebrate!! It is the first year in many that new members have exceeded the deaths in the congregation. Thanks be to God for this wonderful blessing.

We had three weddings here at Zion, which we haven't had for a very long time!! More to be thankful for!!

My goals for 2018:

- 1. Establish a mutual ministries committee. This is a committee that assists the Pastor, much like the committee I had when I was the vicar. It is imperative that the Pastor has a small group of people that can assist the Pastor with the concerns of the church. Some members are not comfortable coming to the pastor and an alternative must be available for them to air a concerns.
- 2. Continue to assist with the growth of Christian education. I will do this with Shirley focusing on our vacation Bible school attendees.
- 3. Have a new pictorial directory completed.
- 4. Make an attempt to contact and visit every member/ family on the current member list.

- ✓ Jim McRoberts has notified Council that at this time, he is unable to participate on Council or the committees that he has so faithfully served. We extend our heartfelt appreciation for all of Jim's dedication and leadership to Zion.
- ✓ Melody Gensure will be on vacation from July 24 through August 4. Pastor Cindy will check messages.
- ✓ Pastor Cindy will be on vacation from August 28 through Sept. 7.

JULY

- ✓ Council approved the proposal by the Capital Campaign Committee that it would pay 2% interest monthly on the loan from the Endowment Fund. Payments on the principle will be made as money is received from gifts and pledges.
- ✓ A report from Mary Mack, the Capital Campaign consultant, was reviewed and discussed.
- ✓ Approval for a 50 Ways Task Force was given, with the project being turned over to Outreach and Worship and Music.

AUGUST

(2) Software package tied to digital map of cemetery so that when you click on a grave site, all information about that site pops up. We input information. (3) All of the above and Legacy Mark inputs the information. The owner recommended option 2 for Zion, especially if the inputting is used as an Eagle Scout project. The cost for option 2 is around \$4,500.

We were able to locate the ledger book which contains all cemetery lot information. Rick Bachman is checking and updating records.

Goals for 2018

- Develop and update an annual maintenance schedule Ongoing
- Review and update property files in parish office
- Update (and perhaps digitize) cemetery records
- Continue review, repair and replacement of elements of heating system Replace thermostats Replace failing window insulating material
- Reviewing lighting needs Replace spotlights in altar window with new ribbon lights Review lighting options in stairwells Secure estimate for lighting corner towers
- Continue wall restoration work where and when needed
- Inspect and improve church entrances Adjust middle Mauch Chunk Street doors Install handrail on right side of corner entrance Handicapped entrance directional signs at Mauch Chunk and corner entrances
- Continue research on the installation of a digital sign to replace the current sign near the corner entrance.

Property highlights

Parsonage

Pastor's family took care of some painting.

A leak in the living room area was investigated.

Exterior

A new power supply and meters have been installed according to modern code guidelines.

Andy Dietrich volunteered to maintain the shrubbery surrounding the church.

Some peeling observed in areas where work was done along Greenwood Street. The peeling was repaired but we are warned that peeling could continue.

A security camera was installed to allow parish administrator to see who is at the door when the doorbell rings. Additional internet bandwidth was needed for the camera to operate effectively.

We initiated a discussion about replacing the corner church sign with a digital sign. Drawings were secured from two providers. Costs range from \$15,000 to \$20,000. Because Zion is located in Tamaqua's Historical District, special permission would be required to have such a sign installed.

Interior

Patching and painting completed in the kitchen pantry. Vent installed in pantry door. A dehumidifer installed and water issues were addressed as well as possible. (Did you know that a spring flows along the inside foundation of Zion's ground floor?)

The former pastor's office, bathroom, handicapped entrance and areas around the main lift were repainted after extensive repairs were made.

The pastor's office was repainted after walls and sills were patched and repaired.

All altar banners are now stored in one of the closets in the choir room. Hanging racks were moved from the pastor's former office area during its restoration.

Office equipment was purchased: scanner for parish admin office; new compute for pastor's office; wi-fi repeaters for throughout the church.

A great deal of time and effort has been spent this year on the heating system including the replacement of thermostats and the restoration of many of the valves in the system. Reigel Plumbing has done much of the work at very reasonable rates.

Downspouts at the handicapped entrance have been blocked by deteriorating underground piping. Repairs began in the fall but will have to be completed next spring at an approximate cost of \$6,000.

Outreach is considering using the current nursery room on the main floor as a Thrift Store which would be open one or two days a week. The room was selected because we can better limit access to the rest of the church. If this idea becomes reality, clothing racks will either have to be purchased or built.

Twelve used padded pews have been purchased for \$1,000 from the closed Mormon Church in Still Creek. They replace pews both upstairs and downstairs that were in need of repair. The old pews have been donated for sale to benefit a local playground.

Cemetery

Walters Monuments of Summit Hill assisted in helping restore some leaning tombstones.

Cemetery guidelines, last revised in 1993, are currently under review and will be sent to council for approver when completed.

A local funeral director suggested that Zion consider housing burial urns for members who request it like churches with memorial gardens or even Penn State that is now offering to do this for alumni. Income possible. More information is needed.

Approved work on the driveway – sealing and patching at a projected cost of around \$1,400.



ENDOWMENT FUND 2017 REPORT

My take on 2017----Zion has grown in many areas including our Endowment Fund.

Our Fund was organized mid 2000, and set up to invest our church money in conservative investments. Purpose was to give back $4 \frac{1}{2}$ of its value each year, to support church expenses.



Also in previous years, the fund provided extra money for the furnace and roof replacements. We also provide low interest loans, including \$128,000 given end of 2016 toward the 1st phase exterior restoration project. The Fund's give back for 2017 was \$15,009. Since 2000, our total distribution has been \$298,542.

Thanks to everyone for their continuing support. Your gifts for 2017 was \$55,939 (which included bequest of \$51,149 from the Robert Becker Estate)

The Fund earning for last year was \$43,572 amounting to a return of 12.6%!! Although we have a professional brokerage account, I would like to thank our committee including---- Bob Jones, Rochelle Evanousky and Steve Ristila----for help in monitoring our investments, and meeting several times a year to "fine tune" our financial holdings.

Zion Finance Committee Report 2017

Robert Jones, Chairperson; Steven Ristila, Vice-Chair and Recording Secretary; Dave Gensure, Treasurer; Ann Marie Hadesty, Financial Secretary; George Taylor; Walter Weston, Rochelle Evanousky and Council Member Sam Caley serve on Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church Finance Committee.

For the first time in recent years the Church ended the year on a positive note financially thanks to the generosity of the Robert Becker Estate. The Church received \$103,298 from his estate. In accordance with the Bylaws when the donor does not designate a special use for the funds then the money is split 50/50 between Current and Endowment. A vote was taken to take \$1,000 from the Endowment share and put it into the Capital Campaign. We thought it would be appropriate to have a leaf on the tree in Robert Becker's name since he was so generous.

We decided to present a new Financial report in the weekly bulletin and Herald this past year. "Supporting Zion's Ministries" has an emphasis on the Budget. Taking a look at the report as it appears in the January 7, 2018 Bulletin you will see that for December 31, 2017, only \$1,439.60 was received when \$3,477.70 is required weekly to meet our budget obligations to support the ministries of your Church. We also received \$125 for Endowment and \$1,577 for the Capital Campaign.

Contributions Year To Date to meet operating Budget Expenses totaled \$209,952.05 which included \$179,293.05 received from offering/gifts/memorials, \$15,009 received from Endowment and \$15,650 received from Culinary.

Budget Operating Expenses Year To Date are \$169,595.84

So when you subtract YTD Budget Operating Expenses of \$169,595.84 from YTD Budget Contributions from YTD Contributions of \$209,952.05 you see we have a budget surplus of \$40,356.21.

That is all well and good but consider this. We need \$3,477.70 a week to meet our budget obligations. We seldom achieve this. The only reason we are ahead this year is the bequest from the Becker estate. This is a good time to consider the legacy you want to leave to your Church. His generosity should be an inspiration to all of us.

We must also thank the Culinary crew. As you see above they contributed \$15,650. They worked very hard this past year. At times their schedule was intense. The money received from Endowment is used to pay our annual insurance premium. Without the contributions from Culinary and Endowment I don't know where we would be.

Again I want to thank all the members of the Finance Committee for the work they put into handling the financial affairs of our church and God's church here at Zion. Dave Gensure, our Treasurer and Ann Marie Hadesty, our Financial Secretary have jobs that can be challenging and difficult at times. Thanks to Steve Ristila, Committee Secretary, for attending the meetings when his work schedule permits, and taking thorough minutes. Thanks to Walter for his comprehensive Endowment reports and his insight into the financial markets. Thanks to George and Rochelle for their knowledge and insight. I want to thank Sam Caley who, as the committee's liaison to Council, presents our motions to Council and provides their feedback to the committee. Thanks to Melody who helps with the reports and makes copies for us. Also I want to thank Pastor Cindy for her counsel and advice. We should thank God for all the wonderful staff and volunteers we have who are so willing to put in the hard work behind the scenes to keep the Congregation alive and growing.

OUTREACH 2017

OUTREACH ANNUAL REPORT

Several years ago when Zion's by-laws were revised, several ministries were brought together under the same umbrella because their missions shared some similarities. Hence, 'Outreach' has characteristics of congregational care, community outreach and evangelism.

Ministries under the Outreach umbrella include the blanket ministry, Care Corps, Christmas and July food baskets, Culinary, the cradle roll, the diaper and flower ministries, the Goods 'N Stuff rummage sale, Joyful Noise, the Prayer Chain, the prayer shawl ministry and World/community mission.

2017 HIGHLIGHTS

- 200 served at New Year's Day dinner
- Over \$2,000 collected for Joyful Noise distribution
- Soup Bowl Sunday results in giving 133 food items to three families and Primitive Methodist's food bank
- Prayer Chain becomes operational and continues to handle numerous requests
- After nearly 20 years of participation, Zion did not have a team in the Relay for Life event. Instead, members of Outreach presented prayer shawls to survivors at the event and invited survivors and caregivers to a Cancer Survivor Service that evening at Zion. Seventy prayer shawls distributed at Relay for Life
- In addition to its numerous socials and food sales, Culinary hosts a free New Year's Day pork and sauerkraut dinner and provides light lunches for fellowship time following the fourth Saturday service of each month except November and December.
- Zion had a presence at both the downtown Summerfest and fall Heritage Day as members sold pretzels and handed out fliers promoting church events
- Trunk or Treat and Whoville Christmas events entertained and provided fellowship to many area families
- Zion was offered as a possible meeting place for the Tamaqua Senior Citizens but parking was an issue
- We continue our support of KIVA, a world-wide outreach that helps people by lending money to help start-up businesses buy goods for resale, plant plants for food, purchase fishing equipment and educational items for teaching, and provide water for communities, among other activities. Through KIVA, we lend money and and get paid back paying so we can lend the money again. We lend \$ 25 each time. Along with other lenders, we become a unit of funding.
- We observed the 200th Saturday service on July 1
- Our July picnic basket project served 22 families
- Volunteers conducted two successful rummage sales in the spring and fall
- 50+ attend annual picnic at the Walker Township Park Sept. 10 hosted by Culinary
- Culinary served a turkey dinner following the "Christmas in July" Saturday service
- We made a \$100 donation to the Guardian "Angel Recover House for Women in Hazleton
- We reviewed a proposal to allow Outreach to keep all funds raised through the Good N Stuff rummage sale for additional outreach activities.
- Culinary served 160+ at the 7th annual Tamaqua Advent Breakfast
- We prepared and covered the cost of mailing Christmas cards to Zion members
- We have initiated live-streaming and archiving of our worship services

We'd like to see increased support from our congregation at our socials and other fundraising events. In addition to attending, members can help by distributing posters and sign-up sheets and collecting orders where they live or work. If you cannot attend, a contribution toward event expenses would be most helpful.

Thrift Store – We are continuing a discussion about opening a Zion Thrift Store either in the church or at a downtown location as an alternative (or in addition) to our twice-a-year rummage sale using the Thrift Store at Trinity Lutheran in Lehighton as a model. Several good reasons come to mind. (1) It is a need in this community. (2) It is an excellent way for Zion to both serve the community and be more visible in the community. (3) It can provide a ministry opportunity for Zion members who current do not have one. (4) It can generate income for the Zion's Outreach efforts. (Trinity Lutheran's Thrift Store generated \$40,000 last year which went to the food pantry it also operates.) Initially, we could seek a partner willing to let us operate the store rent-free until we see if it can fly on its own. The key to this project, however, is not the location but rather the involvement of Zion members who are not already involved in ministries.

Instead of having our congregational picnic on the second Sunday of September, we might explore moving the picnic date and participating in the ELCA's "Helping Hands Day" the second Sunday of September where members of congregation conduct a community service project.

COMMUNITY NEEDS

What does a healthy church look like? We hear a great deal about church size but the size of a congregation does not determine the spiritual health of that congregation.

Congregational engagement is certainly a characteristic of a healthy church. Obviously, attending worship is an important part of church membership but putting our faith into action is equally important to engagement and congregational health.

Tamaqua has many needs and Zion could address some of those needs if each member embraced a ministry. Perhaps you've heard of the 20/80 rule: Twenty percent of a group does 80 percent of the work. You'll find that true in most organization, but for Zion to have maximum impact on our community, 100 percent of our members need to be engaged.

What are some of the needs that we could address?

A year-round thrift store.

A soup kitchen operating 5 days a week

A child development program

An after-school latch key program in church

A summer luncheon program expanding the South Ward playground to Dutch Hill

A community cancer support group

A community care giver support group

A community parenting support group

A community grief support group

A community marriage recovery group

A community divorce support group

Community youth activities

Common Grounds worship service for recovering individuals and their families

Total amount of money culinary returned to Zion \$18,800.00

2017 Capital Campaign Committee Year End Report December 27, 2017

Zion's Capital Campaign Committee currently consists of eight members: Pastor Cindy, Sandy Mehalko, George Taylor, Bob and Gail Jones, Darlene and Dave Fetterman and Frank Rudy. The committee works with a consultant, Mary Mack, who is contracted to conduct research and completes applications for grants. The committee, which meets monthly, began its works about fourteen (14) months ago but remains interested in having new members and encourages individuals who may be interested in serving on the committee to contact Dave. Committee members may include individuals who are not members of Zion.

The following is a list of activities the committee completed and/or supported this past year:

- 1. A Case for Support (Case Statement) and complementary PowerPoint presentation were created to summarize Zion's mission, need, past and present commitment to the community, endowment fund, campaign goals/ budget and how contributors to the campaign are recognized.
- 2. Zion's Capital Campaign held its Kick-Off Banquet on Sunday, April 30 in Fellowship Hall. One hundred thirty people attended. Karl Haufmann provided piano music. Joe Mehalko was emcee and Pastor Mark Wimmer was guest speaker. The dinner was provided by the Zion Culinary Crew under the direction of Gail Jones and served by Zion' youth group. The dinner was offered at no cost to guests under a grant from Thrivent. Thirteen hundred dollars (\$1,300.00) was collected from a free-will offering and deposited in the campaign fund.
- 3. Completion of the campaign's pledge and gift-giving process guidelines for Zion members and non-members
- 4. Completion and mailing of letters to all Zion members explaining the purpose of the campaign and asking individuals and families to make a pledge and/or gift commitment. Thank You letters are sent to members and non-members acknowledging pledges and gifts of \$ 1,000.00 or more.
- 5. Establishment of a process and development of forms for recording, tracking, logging and reporting the number and names of individuals and organizations and dollar amounts of pledges and gifts made by members and non-members. The committee collaborates with Ann Marie Hadesty and Dave Gensure to track and report the names of individuals/organizations and number of pledges/gifts and their amounts.
- 6. An aggregate list of Zion Ministries and Activities (attached) was developed to support the application for grants. The list is periodically updated and maintained by Dave Fetterman.
- 7. Mary Mack researched and contacted, as potential funding sources, a number of foundations that support both churches and historic sites. Two separate proposals were developed, first for The John E. Morgan Foundation for \$500,000 and, second, for The Fund for Sacred Places, a matching grant for \$100,000. Although we did not receive funding from the second, we did have an opportunity to receive constructive feedback from them and will re-apply in 2018. The Morgan Foundation has not yet replied to our request.
- 8. Zion received a gift of \$ 5,000.00 from Jim and Jan McRoberts for the purchase and installation of a Giving Tree (GT) displayed in the church's Gathering Room. The GT permanently displays the engraving of names of individuals and organizations making one-time gifts of \$1,000 or more and those pledging to the campaign for ten years or less. Sandy Mehalko has agreed to coordinate the engraving of names on the leaves with a local vendor.
- 9. Kelsey Zamudio constructed a physical display (thermometer) to track the campaign's progress in dollar amounts of pledges made and pledge and gift amounts received. The thermometer is displayed in the Gathering Room and Bob Jones agreed to keep it updated on an ongoing basis.
- 10. Mary Mack, George Taylor and Dave Fetterman met with Senator Dave Argall, his Chief of Staff and Representative Jerry Knowles to determine the availability of state funds, grants, and other resources to help fund the campaign.
- 11. Mary Mack is in the process of developing a brochure on 'Legacy Giving' for Zion members and nonmembers. She has proposed an agenda for addressing the next phase of the project.
- 12. The capital campaign began to receive pledges and gifts approximately seven (7) months ago. As of November 30, 2017, the capital campaign has received pledges totaling \$ 413,145.00 and has received \$50,400.00 in pledges and gifts. The committee has reimbursed Zion's Endowment Fund \$27,242.00.

COMMUNICATIONS ANNUAL REPORT

Effective communication binds members of a congregation together and unifies them into a strong and healthy church. It also binds that church to the community it serves and to unchurched members of that community seeking comfort and compassion.

What are we doing?

- We advertise our worship services in the newspaper which reaches over 3,000 homes in the Tamaqua area. We also publish regular church news in the Tamaqua column. But consider who reads newspapers these days and who doesn't and how do the people who don't read newspapers get their information?
- Our worship bulletins contain an insert with important information about church events and activities. Ironically, many people leave the entire bulletin package behind after church when it would be beneficial to them to take the insert home with them.
- We publish a monthly newsletter and send it out via email and U.S. mail to those willing to cover mailing costs. We also post the newsletter on our website. Hard copies are available at church.
- We updated our website this year. It contains more information about the church and is updated on a regular basis. In the last 365 days, (as of mid-January) the site received over 77,000 visits.
- We have maintained a Facebook page with up-to-date information.
- We have begun a one-year trial live-streaming and archiving our worship services through Boxcast. This allows Zion to maintain a relationship and engage homebound members who cannot get to church or members who are sick or out of town. Members who no longer live in the area and wish to maintain a relationship with congregation can feel engaged through the webcast services. Live-streaming is electronic evangelism spreading the Word of God far beyond the walls of the church. And while churches do not like to use the word "marketing," it is very much a way of reaching seekers who may eventually attend a live service.

What could be done?

- Make sure all member households should receive a copy of the annual report. Because of the mass amount of information included in the annual report, it is best distributed weeks ahead of the annual meeting if we really want people to have the time to digest that information and ask informed questions. We can develop a method of verifying that every household received an annual report either by email, website download, hard copy at church or hard copy sent by U.S. mail.
- Subscribe to a service such as One Call which provides a way to contact every member through the method of his/her choice (email, voice mail, text). If it reminds members and even non-members of important events or information, it is worth the expense.
- Maintain an up-to-date data base so that contact by preferred method is possible. When a families moves, we need an updated address. When a household drops its landline phone, we need a cell phone number and email addresses are helpful, too.
- Explore ways to increase our use of social media. Our thanks to Kelsy Zamudio who faithfully oversaw the Facebook page for some time and recently decided to step away from that role. Interested? Contact gtay200@verizon.net.
- Regular office hours for the pastor would help facilitate communications. Let's say the pastor has office hours on Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. unless she is called to an emergency. Would that facilitate communications with the congregation? Would that facilitate communications between Zion staff members?

• Replace the current corner church sign with a digital display that would be easier to update and more attractive to passersby. The sign in and of itself would send a message that Zion is a church anchored in tradition with sites set for the future. If we are going to spend nearly \$1 million over the next 10 years to restore our beautiful building, we certainly want to make sure that the building is needed at the end of that time. In addition to the cost, our church is in the Tamaqua Historic District and back-lit signs are not allowed unless by special permission. If a digital display cannot be approved, the current sign still should be replaced with a more contemporary looking fixture.
