ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING MINUTES SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 13, 2022

President Chris Henritzy called the meeting to order. A quorum was established with 41 members in attendance.

Pastor Cindy White opened with a prayer.

Welcome and Introduction of Church Council and Staff: Chris Henritzy-President, Michael Haspe-Vice President, Tiffany Warden-Secretary, Judy Brennan, Sam Caley, Arlene Derr, Glenn Fritzinger, Ernie Henritzy, Brian Lawfer, Steve Ristila, and Mary Ruth Taylor

Staff: Melody Gensure – Parish Administrator Dave Gensure – Treasurer Ann Marie Hadesty – Financial Secretary Sandra Mehalko – Parish Musician Cindy White – Pastor

Secretary's Report: The minutes for the February and December 2021 Congregational meetings were approved on the motion of Dave Fetterman, seconded by Mary Ruth Taylor.

Reception of Financial Reports

Treasurer – Dave Gensure Financial Secretary – Ann Marie Hadesty Audit

All financial reports were reviewed and accepted on the motion of Rochelle Evanousky, seconded by Sandy Mehalko.

Committee Reports:

Finance: Chairperson for this committee was not present for meeting. Congregation members present reviewed submitted 2021 and Council President, Chris Henritzy, fielded questions/concerns to the best of his knowledge. Covid and multiple issues with the church building took place in 2021 ending the year with a deficit of \$3,928.94. Wagner Estate proceeds carried from 2020 significantly helped throughout the year creating less of a deficit than we originally would have had without it.

Endowment: Walter Weston, serving as Endowment Coordinator for 22 years, provided the details of his report for 2021. The included income for the Endowment fund this year totaled \$39,631 which was made up of church envelopes, interest from the Capital Campaign loan, Mission Investment Fund, and investment returns from Oppenheimer. He, again, added the importance of Bequests as this makes up 68.1% of what we currently have in this fund.

Capital Campaign: Dave Fetterman, Chairman for this committee since its formation in 2017, spoke of the details of the Capital Campaign. Since the start of the campaign, \$338,850 has been raised as a result of pledges, memorials, and gifts. Without the support of our congregation, non-members, and the countless people helping with this campaign, none of this would have been possible. This has been quite an accomplishment to say the very least. Also, as of February 3, an additional \$3,700 was paid back to the outstanding balance leaving a current balance of \$42,300. This balance is anticipated to be fully paid by the end of 2022 if giving continues at its current pace.

Property: Mark Valentine discussed innumerable projects completed throughout the year and needs for the church in the future. Some of the major projects tackled in 2021 were the Upper Mauch Chuck Street roof repair, Sanctuary/Gathering room lighting update, kitchen fire suppression system update, unexpected boiler repair/update, and the Greenwood Street roof repair. The lighting update alone was a major undertaking by Mark and his team. This update was started in 2020 and

finalized in April 2021 except for some fine tuning. It is estimated he spent 100+ hours completing the project with an additional 100+ hours put in from the team while saving the church \$10,000+ in labor/supply costs. Looking ahead, the bell tower and window are anticipated to be the next Capital Campaign project. Also on the wish list would be to add better ventilation in the sanctuary, carpentry work in the closet, and updating the lighting in the vestibule. In regards to the cemetery, Ron and Rick have expressed retirement and actively looking for help. A cemetery secretary is also needed at this time.

Outreach: George Taylor expressed his sincere gratitude for the plethora of ministries our church offers to not only support our congregation, but our community. He extended a "thank you" to all those that have helped on an ongoing basis to continue to make these ministries a success. With more than 25 established ministries, there is always an opportunity when someone chooses to become involved. Among these include Diaper Depot, formed in 2018, which has continued to grow year after year and the number of shoppers at the Blessing Thrift Shop also continues to grow. Also, a major asset to our church, the Culinary team, has rallied from the past year of many cancelled events because of Covid and were able to hold 10+ events in 2021 raising approximately \$9,000.

Altar Guild: During the past year, there were six members who helped to prepare the altar for worship. New members are always welcome and encouraged to contact Sandy Graham if interested.

Christian Education: Michael Haspe discussed the areas of Christian Education for the past year. While the beginning of the year continued to present challenges as a result of Covid, the sense of normalcy began to come back as the year went on. Sunday School had a total enrollment of 18 children with in person instruction resuming with the new school year in September. Following a 45-minute class time, the children are permitted to play in the kids' fellowship room downstairs refreshed on God's Work, Our Hands Sunday by Michael and the Lawfer family. Confirmation had a new enrollment total of 2 students with 4 students confirmed on May 23 at the Pentecost 2021 service. VBS returned to in person with a total of 75 children. The curriculum followed for this year was "Discovery on Adventure Island" and left a positive impact on the children and volunteers alike. Adult Education has not resumed this year, but hopeful to begin again in 2022.

Worship and Music: Sandy Mehalko extended her blessings of this past year for the gift of the return of singing and worshipping together. The Senior Choir also returned to their regular schedule. Also mentioned was the introduction of a new liturgy beginning the week following this meeting. The process will be gradual, with a new piece added to the service each week. Sandy will "practice" with the congregation prior to the service until all elements have been added. The existing liturgy, the green hymnal, has been used since 1978.

All committee reports were reviewed and accepted on the motion of Darlene Fetterman, seconded by Mark Valentine.

VII. State of the Congregation

The Attendance report and Giving Step Report were reviewed and discussed.

President's 2021 Summary: Chris Henritzy began by expressing his gratitude again for having the opportunity to serve as Congregational Church Council President. He continued by extending his thankfulness with the trust of the congregation throughout the year as many difficult decisions needed to be made regarding the maintenance of the building. One of these major decisions was that of the furnace being rebuilt. While this was not anticipated and budgeted for, we are thankful to have the money in our Endowment Fund that has helped pay for these costly projects.

President's 2022 Goals: Through faith, the focus of 2022 will to prayerfully find a way to increase giving. Before continuing, Chris wanted to openly thank those that continue to give. While, he stated, this is a very difficult topic, it is one that is necessary and crucial to maintain the church and its foundation.

VIII. Old Business

On the motion of Mary Ruth Taylor, seconded by Monica Akins, Ernie Henritzy was accepted to be an additional member of Church Council. Motion passed.

IX. New Business

Pastor's Goals: Pastor Cindy White commented on the challenges faced by the church and the congregation the past two years as a result of Covid. As things began to have a more positive outlook throughout the year, she expressed 2 of the 4 2021 goals have been reached and continue to be worked on. It was also significant to note that Synod had requested she be Dillion Epler's supervisor through his internship at Saint John's. She noted that this will not interfere with anything that she is called to do at Zion. Dillion will complete his internship May 2023. She then went on to discuss her 2022 goals including creating a new mission statement and continuing with the Stewardship plan amongst others.

X. Adjournment and closing devotions

The meeting was adjourned on the motion of Monica Akins, seconded by Laura Fulmer and closed with a prayer.

Cleaning angels: Ernie and Susan Henritzy; Lori Krell (retired); Trudy Maue and Beth Lattanzi;

Thanks to Ron Dietrich for his years of service as a cemetery caretaker. We also note the years of service given to the cemetery by Rick Bachman.

With much gratitude, we acknowledge the years of leadership Mark Valentine has provided the property committee.

JANUARY

• Cemetery fence repair update – Upper fence repair work completed; lower work yet to be done but will be paid for by Tamaqua Borough. Its workers did the damage.

• Greenwood roof repair: Roman still has about 10 days of work on roof area above Gebert Chapel and the area above the organ pipes. He may be able to do the work in the next few days depending on the weather. Roman reinstalled the snow anchors on that side of the church which had been incorrectly installed. He also found issues with the gutter drains which he hopes he has resolved.

• Security: Cameras have in installed in various location in the church

• Girls Scouts update: Mark Valentine reports that the scouts have left the building. Scout leader came in and remove their items. They will be meeting at the Elks Club.

FEBRUARY

• Sanctuary lighting/ethernet connectors – work completed Jan. 18-19; MCullion bill for \$1,992 approved for payment

• Kitchen update/freezers-Large freezer repaired and coils of large frig cleaned; bill for \$655 could be split between Culinary and Blessings; A smaller freezer has been donated; not frost-free; will have to be watched for ice build-up.

- Ventilation- Mark looked at installing louvers on right wall of sanctuary to help cool the area in summer.
- Vestibule lighting-Mark has contacted All Phase about possible replacement fixtures; perhaps wall fixtures

MARCH

• Greenwood roof repair- Roman finished major work March 4. A few minor issues to address. Invoices totaling \$12,300 approved for payment.

• Furnace-Mark has been working with Reigel to determine why furnace at time runs more than necessary; Mark found two stuck valves. The boiler was inspected by someone from the Pa. Dept. of labor and Industry.

• George Taylor reported that a new used video switcher was purchased for \$216 to replace our original unit we've used for four year has developed some issue. George also reports that additional wireless mics have been purchased for use downstairs during VBS. The cost (\$104) will be taken from the VBS fund.

APRIL

- Mark will talk with Rick Bachman to see if we can obtain a copy of the newest cemetery map.
- Inspections-28 fire extinguishers in the building are due for hydrostatic testing; J&K of Kingston will do the work
- In-line water heater arrive for the Gathering Room all-gender bathroom but was the wrong model.

MAY

- Mark reviewed the check-in sheets at the cemetery shed so that people know what has been done and what needs to be done.
- Kitchen update-conduit installed-circuit breakers should be here in July
- Fire extinguisher inspection-testing will be done this month \$2,000 cost
- Food pantry/thrift store shelving- installed and looks good

JUNE

• Lower lift- Repair person came June 8. Lift is now working. Waiting for bill.

JULY

- Cemetery caretaker-Existing copies of job description distributed. A few changes made. Will review at future meeting.
- Personnel/Cemetery secretary needed
- Map -Mark got map duplicated at Staples. Map needs to be updated especially in the newer area.
- Skip Anderson did dome weeding; Andy Dietrich will do trimming
- The bell frame needs painted-Would have to be scraped, primed and painted.

AUGUST

• Cemetery fence repair update – Mark is contacting Rob Jones at Borough Hall to explore options for repairing the lower fence for which the which the borough is responsible. The upper fence was damaged by a trucker. His company paid for the repairs.

• Property recommends that discussions begin as soon as possible about the next phase of the exterior project. Will there be enough money to fund the project? How much come is yet to in through the 5- and 10-year capital campaign pledges?

SEPTEMBER

• Mark has contacted DeGruchy to provide new estimates for remaining projects. Some projects may be split into two projects to make them more financially manageable.

OCTOBER

• Reviewed deGruchy's updated bids – Mark recommends the tower project by done first.

Bell tower - \$257,000

Gable and window next to bell tower: \$148,000

Bell tower and gable area done together: \$388,000

Upper Mauch Chunk Street (above chime tower): \$177,000

• Cleaning angels: Lori Krell is "retiring" at the end of the year. This leaves us with two teams: Ernie and Susan Henritzy and Trudy Maue and Beth Lattanzi

• Mark is considering resigning as chair of property. He is concerned with the amount of time taken away from other things he needs and wants to do.

NOVEMBER

• Other-Mark was contacted by a monument company out of Breingsville regarding the placement of markers on a certain lot. The lot number given does not match up with cemetery records. Mark said that he and Rick Bachman will meet to review records. (Note: Rick passed away for a meeting could take place.)

• George explained that he reviewed lists of 10-year and 5-year pledges to try to get some idea of how much funding might be expected. Two issues surfaced. First, there are people on both lists with pledges on both lists. We need to determine which pledge is actually a working pledge. Second, people working on the 10-year pledge should be at least half-way to their commitment amount. Some are behind and, therefore, their pledges amount is questionable. ENDOWMENT FUND 2022 REPORT

Looking back to the 70's our finance committee bought CD's and invested in the Lutheran Brotherhood funds. We had a saving balance of \$103,773 at the end of 1999.



During 2000, after ZION'S inherited money from two-member family bequests, pastor asked me to form a committee and start an ENDOWMENT Fund. I thank all my committee members and all who have supported and contributed to this fund. Also, Bequests helped to fund 68 % of the contributions.

Our Fund annually returns 4 ½ % of its value to the church budget including extra support in 2009 to pay off a bank loan of \$92,172 for roof and furnace replacement. Past two years we add \$42,000 to help pay for emergency roof repairs. Since the start the Fund has returned \$479,561 back to Zion's.

Also, we are glad that Fund was able to finance loans for the exterior restoration project with an interest rate at 2%.

Endowment value at the end of 2022 was \$422,094

Endowment investment includes 36% fixed bank notes and cd's with 64% invested in single stocks—managed with MCT TRUST

Now for the bad news----our investments lost 12.7% last year it appears that the stock market dropped between 21% to 25% in 2022. Hoping for better returns for 2023?

Zion Finance Committee Report 2022

Robert Jones, Chairperson; Dave Gensure, Treasurer; Ann Marie Hadesty, Financial Secretary; Pastor White; George Taylor; Walter Weston; Rochelle Evanousky; Matthew Warden and Council Member Sam Caley serve on Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church Finance Committee.

The Church was still dealing with the aftermath of Covid and multiple issues with the building. We ended the year with a budget deficit of \$8,385.17.

Once again income was not sufficient to cover expenses and a total of \$54,000 was withdrawn from the Endowment Fund to cover the shortfall. The Committee sees a dangerous trend that money to support the Church is now coming out of Endowment and not from giving and/or gifts. Finance thanks Endowment Committee for managing the Church's assets.

Culinary Team. A total of \$12,945 was raised by Culinary activities. We thank the Culinary for all their dedication and hard work.

Thrift Store. The hard working group behind this ministry were able to raise \$6,912.66. Thank you for your efforts!

Thrivent. Many of our members have savings invested with this organization. All qualified members are eligible to apply for 2 Thrivent Action Team Projects per year. Thrivent gives a \$250 "Community Impact Card" which is a VISA card which may be used as seed money to purchase supplies. Both Culinary and Property have in the past had Action Teams to work on various projects and socials. In addition, Thrivent also has what is called "Choice Dollars". Eligible members can designate where Thrivent distributes a portion of its charitable money. The amount a person receives is based on their insurance premiums and contract values. As a result of this program Zion received \$596 last year. We thank all of our Thrivent members for what they have done to help the Church throughout the past year.

Boyer's and Redner's cards. The Church received \$537.30 from Boyers, and \$217.83 from Redners. Please remember to use these cards when shopping.

Amazon Smiles. The Church received \$163.55 from this program.

The people of Zion are blessed to have received so much but keep in mind without the financial contributions listed above we would not have been able to pay our bills. The weekly offerings and other income would not have been enough to cover our expenses.

We have a hard working, dedicated Finance Team and I thank everyone for all the effort they put into our work this past year. I especially want to thank Dave, Ann Marie and our Parish Administrator Melody for the exceptional work they do.

PHONELIVESTREAM SERVICE REPORT 2022

Phonelivestream changed its billing practices in September. Our monthly \$59 fee gives us 2071 minutes of listening time. Anything over that is billed extra. To prevent overage charges, we now limit our phone streaming to the 2071 minutes. When we get close to the 2071 minutes, we stop phonestreaming for the month.

On average we have 4 to 6 people listening to an event, sometimes as few as 2. At onetime we had several people donating to cover the monthly fees. That is not now the case. So, we are considering whether or not spending \$708 a year is cost effective reaching a rather small number of people.

Kid's Fellowship Area: The kid's fellowship area in the former nursery continues to be utilized every Sunday following Sunday school. As the children are aging the need for a more age appropriate room for the older children has surfaced. This is in the planning stages with a hope to be completed by the end of 2023. The new room would provide more age appropriate activities for older children. A wish list from the older children includes an O Gauge scale train set, chalkboards and easels to create are, and a ping pong table. The goal of the fellowship rooms are to give children a safe space for fellowship and play. Activities, crafts, toys, and games are still needed for older children.

Sunday School students studied the book of Genesis throughout the fall term. Lessons surrounding the Nativity of our Lord through the Advent season. Students will study the life and teaching of Jesus Christ in the Spring term of 2023. Following a 45-minute class time the children are permitted to play in the kid's fellowship room downstairs.

Confirmation:

Total Enrollment: 2 Teachers: Pastor Cindy White, & Michael Haspe

1 Student was confirmed at the Pentecost 2022 service on June 5. As customary confirmation took a break for the summer months. Confirmation classes resumed in September with 1 student eligible for The Rite of Confirmation on Pentecost in 2023. Due to lack of Sunday school during the interim of no full time Pastor we have continued working towards the challenges on educating the confirmation students on traditional bible learning that would normally happen during Sunday school. The students are currently in Year B and studying the Old & New Testament, & Lutheranism 101. Under the current 2-year period of instruction attendance has steadily declined since 2017. Most Lutheran Churches in the ELCA, have a 1-year (or less) period of instruction. Pastor Cindy and I are actively investigating new Confirmation curriculum in an effort to increase attendance while maximizing impact on learning. The hope was to have a curriculum in place for 2022, however we did not identify a curriculum that provided the education we were looking for. The goal to identify a fresh curriculum is still ongoing with hopes we will find something for the for the 2023-2024 instruction year.

First Holy Communion: There were 3 children registered for First Holy Communion classes in 2022. 3 of the students have received first holy communion. The class is led by Pastor Cindy White & Michael Haspe.

Adult Education at Zion: Adult Sunday School signups have been on the Gathering Room table since the start of the fall term. To date we only have 1 member that has signed up for Adult Education opportunities.

Vacation Bible School: 75 children were in attendance. We used Cokesbury's 2022 program "Food Truck Party". The program left a positive impact on both the children that attended, as well as VBS volunteers. During Food Truck Party "Chefs" assisted First Time Food Truck Owner "Top Chef Mike", and DJ Cupcake open his "On a Roll Food Truck". Students learned the mealtime prayer by using the 5 Daily Specials (God is Great!, God is Good!, Let us thank God for our food., By God's hand we all are fed., Give us Lord this day our daily bread). By the end of the week the evidence of the effectiveness of the program was evident. Many parents expressed it was the first time they saw their child pray. The children had a very positive reaction to the puppet/person characters. After the opening assembly children rotated through Bible Explorations with Deb Davies, Crafts & Missions with Judy Brennan, Music with Beth Marcavage, and Ashley Heatter, and Science with Ells Davis. The week finished out with a half lesson day, and the Food Truck Themed Party closing! At the closing party children sang songs, ate dinner together, and shared fellowship with DJ Cupcake, their families, children, and VBS staff. A huge thank you to all VBS volunteers, group leaders, and all who donated! The 2023 Theme is Cokesbury's Hero Hotline. Your continued support is appreciated. GENEROSITY CAMPAIGN 2022

It's been eight years since we've had any kind of stewardship program here at Zion. The last program in 2014 was entitled "Make It Simple."

We have gotten somewhat out of practice when it comes to giving.

This fall we participated in "Building a Culture of Generosity" offered by the ELCA through a professional fundraising company. We followed the program to the T.

We found the emphasis of BCG enlightening: "Instead of focusing on our own need to give as we should, all too often we mistakenly center on the need of the church to receive."

We have shared inspiring stories of how Zion ministries have affected members and impacted the community. We've shared visions of new ministries to share God's love: "The wonder of it all is what God invites us to be a part of--God's church and to experience the joy and blessing of generously supporting and extending its mission."

Our generosity campaign has left us with some important lessons.

(1) To fully support Zion's many ministries, giving must be intentional and not accidental. We asked the congregation to complete intent cards to help members plan their giving for the coming year. Sixty-two members answered the call to complete intent cards, freeing a \$2,000 challenge gift to be used for our Christian Education program and as seed money to start a Stephen Ministry program in Tamaqua.

(2) We strive to make giving more consistent. To that end, we have developed a new online giving page through Vanco. The page is beautiful. It highlights many of our ministries and provides a safe, secure easy way to give automatically using credit cards or bank accounts. Three people used our previous online giving page which many felt was not very user friendly. Eleven people are currently using the new giving page. We'd like to double and maybe triple that number this year.

There is a fee for using the page. The fee can be paid by the giver or by the church. If the fee bothers you, maybe you do not know that the church pays over 33,000 a year sending out envelopes that statistics show that a 1/3 of our congregation do not use. If we continue to increase the number of members using automatic online giving so that giving becomes more consistent, more stable, then the fee – even if it's paid by the church – becomes somewhat irrelevant.

(3) Finally, we strive to help our members grow in their giving. We encourage growth in giving because it can reflect a growth in faith: "For too long, we centered mostly on the side entitled "The Need of the Church." We need to begin concentrating on the side headed "My Need to Give" for giving is an integral part of spiritual life and growth."

Even if you did not complete an intent card but you've paid attention and you understand that Zion's ministries thrive when giving that is planned, consistent and progressive, well then, we've done our job.

"Building a Culture of Generosity" was not meant to be a quick fix but rather it has allowed Zion leadership to refocus attention on ministry, mission and impact. "Building" implies an ongoing process and that process has hopefully been restarted here at Zion.

DID YOU KNOW

Zion officially as of Jan. 1, 2023, has 387 members on its role and 336 giving units. (Husband and wife members are treated as a single giving unit.)

As of October 2022, 51% of Zion's congregation has participated in the capital campaign by either making a pledge or giving a gift to the campaign.

Our constitution defines an active voting member as one who has communed and made a contribution of record in the last two-year period.

If one fails to accomplish one of the two during the two-year period (communed and contributed), he/she is an active non-voting member.

If one fails to do either (communed and contributed) in a two-year period, he/she is an inactive member.

As of Jan. 1, 2023 ...

118 members of Zion have not made a contribution of record in the last 2 years;

86 members of Zion have not had a communion of record in the last 2 years; and

52 members of Zion have not made a contribution of record and have not had a communion of record in the last 2 years.

2022 Events:

October 9 – Heritage Festival Fundraiser: Hand-Rolled Soft Pretzels, and Caramel Apples. Funds raised for future free fellowship activities \$1,352.00.

November 13 – Congregational Christmas Ornament Making: Participants made Christmas ornaments that were handed out throughout Advent and on Christmas season. 30 people attended the class. The children came down from Sunday School to assist in the fellowship of ornament making.

Family Christmas Event: 34 children and 32 adults attended the event. Participants enjoyed a craft goodie bag, a Christmas movie, a visit from Santa Claus, and a Make Your Own Merry Christmas Sundae!
